**Unity** is the feeling that everything fits together. It is a feeling of oneness. The opposite of unity is disunity, a feeling of disorder. In art, **unity** is often achieved ...

Variety is often said to be "the spice of life." In art, variety is like a spice. A totally unified work is likely to be boring if it has no variety.

Variety is the use of contrasting \_\_\_\_\_\_ to make something interesting.

- The contrast, or difference, may be subtle, such as a \_\_\_\_\_\_\_in texture or color within an area.
- It may be more obvious, such as a sharp difference in the materials, sizes of shapes,
   color or lighting.
- Just as we appreciate unity and variety in nature, we seem to want unity and variety in our lives - and in our art.

Sometimes works are unified by proximity or continuity.

- Proximity means that parts are grouped together, enclosed or \_\_\_\_\_ into sets.
- Continuity means that edges of forms are lined up so your eye moves from one part to another in a definite order.
