

Crop prices dropped, and many farms were subject to bank foreclosures. Then, enormous dust storms created by drought and winds swept through the land, making it uninhabitable and unworkable. Most of the died and the machinery was rendered



at the bleakness – extended over some 25,000 square miles of land, from Texas to . In a forced migration under heavy clouds of uprooted soil, farmers and their families, many in beaten up cars, fled west hoping to find work. Most lived for years in poverty and some never recovered.
